All Hands on Deck for Mission Day! Saturday, October 19




Everyone is invited to meet in Pioneer Hall at 8:00am for a light breakfast and participate in one or more of the following activities:




PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN

The October mission project for the Presbyterian Women is the WPC Blessing Box for the homeless, located in the lower circle drive. Suggested items are: Wet wipes, combs, toothbrushes, toothpaste, socks, large band aids, ChapStick, wash cloths, and shampoo.

In addition, we can accept single serve items that do not need preparation and have a long shelf life, such as fruit and pudding cups, containers or pouches of crackers and tuna, chicken salad, cereal and breakfast bars, granola bars, peanut butter crackers, Vienna sausages, fruit rollups, Slim Jims, water, instant coffee, spiced cider, or hot chocolate. Gloves and toboggans are also welcome.

Donations may be placed in the containers just outside the church office.

NEWS FROM THE KITCHEN



Have you ever wondered what they mean by "sell by date, use by date, expiration date"?????? I will try to give you a few pointers or further muddy the waters.

Sell By Date: The date the store has to sell by or reduce for quick sell. If the item is a perishable one, use immediately or freeze, i.e. meat or dairy products, even milk.

Use By Date: This date is for optimal freshness and flavor. Can you use past that date? Absolutely. Remember, your food doesn't know what date it is.

Expiration Date: Same as use by date. However; when you have a fridge full of leftovers, generally use within 7 days.

Always remember to use the FIFO method, first in first out. Rotate your pantry and freezer regularly.

Some of you asked for my Dill Pickle Dip Recipe. Here you have it:

8 oz. cream cheese, softened 1 cup dill pickle relish, drained 1Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce ½ tsp. onion powder 1½ cups grated cheese Dill weed

- * Mix all ingredients EXCEPT grated cheese.
- * Stir in grated cheese.
- * Form into a ball.
- * Sprinkle with dill weed.
- * Refrigerate for an hour or so.







SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Session Highlights Stated Session Meeting Minutes July 28, 2019

A full copy of the Session Minutes is available on the bulletin board across from the Office Manager's office.

Detailed committee reports are also available. Some committee highlights will be contained in various parts of this report. However, since Session reports are posted in their entirety, information in this newsletter is presented in an abbreviated format, containing only important motions and other pertinent information.

Treasurer's Report (Steve Martinat)

Steve reported that total revenues, through June, were \$174,492. Total expenses were \$245,762 for a shortfall of \$71,270. After the approved budget offset of \$24,086 the shortfall to date is \$47,183. Steve said that pledges, for this time of year, are low. He said that the reason for low contributions may be caused by the delay in sending out the contribution statements to all church members. He said that our auditors, Lowdermilk and Church, reviewed our records in June. Steve said that he will be meeting with Sheila, Kela, Jim Rostan, and the auditors on August 7 to review their findings. He said that contribution statements were mailed in July. On a positive note, he said that our endowment funds are back to where they were before paying for the new organ and the slate floor in the sanctuary. Steve answered several questions from the Elders. Some committees did not get their financial reports for the end of June. Steve said he would have reports to all committees for the end of July. Steve said that with the closing of Wells Fargo Bank, our accounts will be transferred to First Citizens Bank.

Approved Motions (other than routine):

Motion: To authorize the Garden Committee to sell a 1953 Ford Ferguson Tractor with the proceeds being returned to the Garden Committee. Motion: The Worship Committee moves to approve the attached changes to the Wedding Booklet.

Motion: The Worship Committee moves the approval of the Baptism of Boston Ace Bollinger, son of Benny Bollinger and Katie Gravel on August 4, 2019.

Motion: To send the revised Electronic Communication Guidelines to Session (pending subcommittee approval).

A motion was made by W.T. and seconded by John to postpone this motion to a future meeting because the written policy for the Electronic Communication Guidelines was not available for review before the Session meeting. This motion was approved unanimously.

Motion: That half of the festival proceeds go to benefit the Dry Bottoms Ministry, and the other half be used for possible upgrades to the WPC playground.

Other News

Soccer Camp - Soccer Camp was huge success, with 61 kids participating in the camp. Kevin said a great amount of gratitude should be given to all the volunteers, kitchen staff, and others who worked for the successful outcome of the camp.

Vehicle usage – Kevin stated that we should list any items for maintenance for any church vehicle and give this information to Fred.

Bus replacement – Kevin stated that there is a plan underway to replace the old large bus that is used by the church. The plan is to replace it with a 15 passenger van. Details of the purchase, financing, and insurance issues will be completed by the Property Committee, with a report to Session at a later date.

Kevin noted that a total of 1,069 pounds of potatoes were collected out of the Community Garden by a group of 12 volunteers. He also said that the Garden Committee will sell a 1953 tractor, with the proceeds going back to the Community Garden.

The long-term support committee is still working to secure at least two families to partner with. Dr. Frederick shared that it is important to establish these partnerships to help congregants who are willing to aid in the sustainability of the program understand its viability. Jeanene Burris suggested reaching out again to Valdese (Charles Williams) and Drexel (Jessie Gravel) Elementary principals to aid in the search. Ed McFadden relayed that he would use CAM as a conduit for potential recipients. Jeanene Burris will also be following up on a family in need of which she is aware.

Carolyn Williams stated that the Nominating Committee has met and has nominees for three Elders and four Deacons.

Financial Secretary's job description revision is underway and will probably be complete in September. (Frank Grill stated that the Financial Secretary's 16-hour work week will be extended to December).

The air conditioning in the narthex has been repaired. Cost was \$4,000.

The gas line for the sanctuary heat was installed. Cost was included in the \$6,000 cost for the furnace.

The main water heater will need to be replaced. Cost will be \$4,250.

The Fire Inspector has completed the follow-up inspection.

There was no report from S&F, but Kevin discussed Gunter's recent surgery and his proposed treatment. We all wish Gunter a speedy recovery.

There will be a service of Racial Harmony at our church on September 9, at 7:00pm.

There will be a blessing of the Pets on the front lawn at 4:00pm on October 13. Rain day for the event will be October 20.

Vacation Bible School – The committee thanked Connie Massagee for the beautiful animal paintings for Bible

School, and also a thanks to Jason and all the VBS volunteers.

The "Make It, Take It" program had 10 children in June, and 12 in July.

Rally day will be September 8. There will be a continental breakfast in the breezeway.

Confirmation classes will take place in the spring of 2020.

Jan Garrou commented on the excellent work that Coron Jordan is doing as Kitchen Coordinator.




